TCNA coordinates with the City to provide a dumpster for your convenience. This saves you a trip to the landfill.

Do not put hazardous materials in the dumpster. Take them to the Sisson Street landfill on October 5 and 6 between 9:00-4:00. The landfill is on Sisson Street just south of 29th Street.

You can also recycle metal and electronics at the Sisson Street landfill, Monday through Saturday, instead of putting those materials in the dumpster.

The "Woods" - a year later

It was just about this time last year that several Tuscany Road neighbors heard that 33 Warrenton Road was for sale. The alarming part about this sale was that the property included close to 3 acres of wooded property along Tuscany Road in our



neighborhood. Even though the owners of 33 Warrenton Road had been exemplary stewards of the property for years, there was genuine concern about the effects that any development of the wooded property might have on the neighborhood. There were also very real environmental fears about how full or partial removal of trees and bushes might affect the Stony Run stream valley.

We reported through newsletters and at the spring and fall community meetings how the neighborhood mobilized and, working with Calvert School earlier this year, eventually reached a satisfactory decision about the future of the "Woods".

A tremendous effort was made by neighborhood volunteers who, working closely with Councilwoman Mary Pat Clarke, attended 3 meetings of the Planning Commission and one meeting of the Zoning Board; met at least 20 times; leafleted the neighborhood about upcoming meetings 4 or 5 times; joined the TCNA Calvert Woods and Negotiating Committees; consulted with outside consultants on development and zoning issues; raised money for consultants and attorney's fees and hung in there until it was all completed. The TCNA Board diligently oversaw the process for 10 months.

This spring representatives of TCNA, the Gardens of Guilford, the Ridgewood & Ridgemede Apartments, and the Tuscany–Lombardy signed an agreement with Calvert School that gave permission for Calvert to purchase the wooded property along Tuscany Road and to build an educational building on it. The agreement is on the TCNA website as the Second Amendment to the 2001 Covenants with Calvert School.

This summer TCNA registered its consent to the purchase of the property with the City Planning Commission and the Zoning Board. Then with the neighborhood's approvals in hand Calvert was able to purchase the property. Both the purchase and the 20-year agreement about the use of the land have been recorded.

Done...!

Calvert School

- The new entrance to the Lower School is completed and expected to speed up the afternoon carpool line. The requirement is the carpool line should not go beyond Ridgemede Road.
- There are no firm plans to move ahead with construction of the new educational building at this time.

 To address safety concerns some large trees near the headmaster's house/Castalia have been cut down. As part of routine maintenance branches have had to be removed from several trees near Tuscany Road



- The Roland Park Public School Bus has added an additional stop at 116 W University Parkway in order to help decrease the congestion at Tuscany and Canterbury Road during dismissal times.



From time to time residents have inquiries about crime and up until now the TCNA President has been consulting with Councilwoman Clarke and handling these queries. We are expanding the scope of the Committee now to include these situations. Major Gibson from Northern District says that although there has been some property crime in the neighborhood, crime has gone down and we are still one of if not the safest neighborhoods in the City. We are trying to get Major Gibson to speak at our November neighborhood meeting.

In the meantime, please continue the defensive measures you have been using to show the bad guys that there are slim pickins in Tuscany-Canterbury.

39th Street Calming Plan

Phase 2 of the 39th Street Plan was approved by the TCNA membership in June. The Calming Plan is a joint plan between TCNA and the Broadview Apartments.

- Phase 2 includes adding pavers and furniture to the median strip between the Hopkins Deli and the Broadview. (Paid for by the Broadview – thank you!)
- 100 W 39th Street was repaved this summer and all the potholes are gone. The painting of a parking lane still needs to be completed this fall and should help slow down traffic.




- Three additional crosswalks are planned and will be painted in the near future. The crosswalks will be between the (1) Broadview and Hopkins Deli, (2) the Broadview and its parking lot across the street, and (3) a crossing in front of Cypriana Restaurant.
- The Broadview, Councilwoman Mary Pat Clarke, and TCNA are working to convince the City to add a speed table in this area to slow down traffic. The City has changed its position -- from never going to happen to let's talk about it.

Ambassador Apartments Construction Update

This week Councilwoman Mary Pat Clarke and Linda Eberhart (co-president TCNA) met with the manager of the Ambassador, the president of the construction company doing the work, and the foremen working on site.

Outside work will be done by Thanksgiving (weather permitting). This means that the dumpsters and fencing will be gone and the sidewalks and parking will return. This is a picture that shows part of the renovated area. See our website for more pictures and the final plan.



The construction on the terrace area (shown above) is 95% complete. The landscaping portion with irrigation will begin as soon as the rains stop (this week). Thousands of pounds of soil will be place in the gigantic garden areas and over 1400 small and large plants will be planted this fall. In order for this work to happen, the entrance to the back of the garden needs to remain open for the large equipment to have access to move all the dirt and large plants. Once the landscaping is done, an ADA ramp will be built from 39th Street to the gardens. This will complete the final portion of the outside work. When that is completed all the outside materials, dumpsters, and equipment will be removed.

Work will still continue to repair the second underground level of the parking garage. It was requested that the dumpster for that work be placed closer to their parking garage and not disrupt any parking or sidewalks on Canterbury Road.

SPEED CAMERA: NEW in Tuscany-Canterbury



The city's speed camera monitoring system consists of portable and fixed speed cameras that detect vehicles exceeding the posted speed limit by at least 12 miles per hour. The speed cameras <u>operate in</u> <u>city school zones Monday through Friday, from 6:00 AM to 8:00</u> **PM all year** long and the violation is \$40.00.

Just a heads-up to all TCNA residents: we received a notice from Baltimore City -- this information was also in the newspaper -- that a NEW speed camera has been installed between **001 to the 200 block of West University Parkway**. Speed limit is 30MPH.

Zoning Issues: Illegal Signs in the Neighborhood

UPDATE: Now there are NO Advertising Flags in front of The Social Apartments



The Tuscany-Canterbury Board voted on June 6, 2018 to oppose any permits that would allow advertising flags. With the help of Councilwoman Clarke, the twelve feather flags were finally removed this summer. The additional signs on the building are not allowed and TCNA is working to have those signs also removed.

TCNA will continue to work with the City and management at the Social Apartments and other buildings in the neighborhood to make sure that any outdoor marketing efforts are consistent with City zoning requirements.

ACTION ALERT

A City Council Bill has been introduced that is a complete rewrite of the sign regulations in Baltimore City. This new legislation will remove from the zoning code "Feather Flags and other Attention Getting Temporary Signs." If this legislation without amendments becomes law, feather flags will be allowed in all areas of Baltimore City.

The TCNA board voted to fight this regulation and attended the Planning Commission Hearing on September 7 with Councilwoman Mary Pat Clarke to oppose these changes and proposed an amendment to prohibit feather flag signs from all residential areas.

The Planning Department realizes that this is an issue that needs to be resolved. An information hearing will be held, tentatively the first week of October, to discuss any amendments that are proposed.

October 18 at 1:30, the Planning Commission will meet and vote on the bill and any proposed amendments. Then the legislation will return to the City Council for final approval.

PLANS FOR BISHOP'S SQUARE PARK

The Bishop's Square is a small park located at the northwest corner of University Parkway and Charles Street. The Cathedral of the Incarnation and One Water Partnership are paying for 27 new trees to be planted in late October or early November. VOLUNTEERS WILL BE NEEDED to help with the plantings.

The large trees will be typical large canopy street trees such as oaks and elms. The small trees will be hawthorns and serviceberries and will be located behind the monument with a few of small trees along University Parkway.

Thank you to One Water Partnership and the Cathedral of the Incarnation who paid for these improvements. A special thanks goes to Fred Chalfont who lives on Cloverhill Road and is a former president of TCNA for moving this plan forward.



Tuscany-Canterbury 100th Year Celebration

The row houses on Cloverhill and Canterbury Roads were known as University Homes, 1916-1920. This was the beginning of the current Tuscany-Canterbury Neighborhood. A committee has been formed and is chaired by Kenna Forsyth to plan a celebration in the spring.

Streets and Greens


